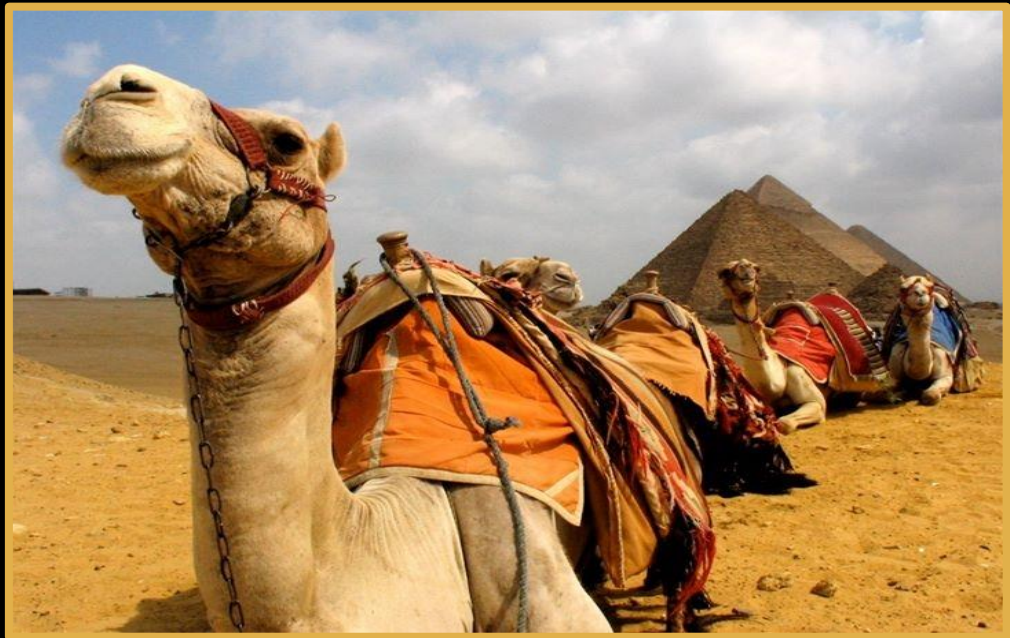
### Visit the Sphinx

The **Great Sphinx of Giza** commonly referred to as the **Sphinx**, is a limestone statue of a reclining or couchant that stands on the Giza Plateau on the west bank of the Nile in Giza, Egypt. The face of the Sphinx is generally believed to represent the face of the Pharaoh Khafra.



It is the largest monolith statue in the world, standing 73.5 metres (241 ft) long, 19.3 metres (63 ft) wide, and 20.22 m (66.34 ft) high. It is the oldest known monumental sculpture, and is commonly believed to have been built by ancient Egyptians of the Old Kingdom during the reign of the Pharaoh Khafra .

**About the Dubai Museum:** The museum was opened by the ruler of Dubai in 1971, with the aim of presenting the traditional way of life in the Emirate of Dubai. It includes local antiquities as well as artifacts from African and Asian countries that traded with Dubai. It also includes several dioramas showing life in the emirate before the advent of oil, in addition to artifacts from recent discoveries as old as 3000 B.C. In 2007, Dubai Museum welcomed 1,800 visitors daily, with a yearly total of 611,840. In March 2008, the Museum had 80,000 visitors. The most popular times are from August to April. The Museum received over 1 Million Visitors in the year 2013.

## ***THINGS TO KNOW BEFORE YOU GO***

### ***ABOUT CAIRO***

#### **Entry Requirements**

A passport and visa are required for U.S. citizens traveling to Egypt. **Tourists can obtain a renewable single-entry 30-day tourist visa on arrival at Egyptian airports for a 25 USD fee.** Egyptian immigration officials occasionally have denied entry to travelers without explanation. U.S. citizens who have experienced difficulty with their visa status in Egypt or are concerned about their eligibility for a visa upon arrival should apply for a visa at an Egyptian embassy or consulate prior to travel. Visas for gainful employment or study in Egypt must be obtained prior to travel.

#### **How are we getting around?**

We will be relying on the expertise of On The Go travel to guide us around Cairo

#### **Should I be concerned about terrorism?**

In the four years since the ending of the Arab Spring, Egypt has made a quick economic rebound driven by energy, infrastructure, and healthcare (source: <http://www.cnbc.com/id/102141210>). While terrorist attacks are still a concern, most of the it occurs in the Sinai Peninsula, 4 hours east of Giza.

#### **The Treatment of women**

Egyptians are known to harass women walking alone. It is suggested that you only leave the airport if you are staying with the group.

#### **What can you bring into Egypt**

Egypt imposes large import duties on electronics, including cameras, stereos, and laptop computers. There is no problem bringing in items for personal use, but if you're traveling with diving equipment, a laptop, or extensive video or photographic equipment, you may find yourself required to register them upon entry. This will actually reduce your hassle on exit, as it makes it easy to prove that you haven't sold anything during your visit.

#### **What to wear?**

Egyptians place a lot of stock in dressing well in informal situations, and a good pair of slacks and a few long-sleeved shirts should come with you on your holiday. For women, loose-fitting long-sleeved shirts and trousers or long skirts are the

best choice.

### **Appropriate Gestures**

The soles of your shoes are unclean, and it is offensive to point them or even show them. Be careful to keep your feet pointed at the floor. In addition, pointing at someone with your finger can be seen as disrespectful.

Platonic same-sex friends often hold hands in the street, but it is quite daring for men and women to do so. Cheek-kissing and hugging are de rigueur displays of respect and warmth between men and women, but any kind of public displays of affection are highly inappropriate between couples.

Photographing anything official, from the traffic policeman to government buildings and even bridges, will usually prompt an official warning and in many cases some kind of attempt to seize your film and camera.

### **Tipping**

Tipping is as expected in Cairo as it is in the US. Tip any waiter or server a percentage of your meal after eating.

### **Is the Water safe to Drink**

Tap water in Egypt is not generally suitable for drinking

## **ABOUT DUBAI**

### **Entry Requirements?**

Citizens of the USA, Australia, Canada, Ireland, New Zealand, the United Kingdom are not required to have a visa for stays of less than 30 days. They will be granted a free-of-charge One Entry Visit Visa upon arrival, and can extend for up to a total stay of 60 days for AED 620. A penalty of AED 100 per day is charged to visitors who overstay. For longer stays, travelers must obtain a visa before arrival in the U.A.E.

### **How are we getting around?**

We will be once again relying on our good friends at Perillo Tours for our transportation needs.

### **What is the currency of Dubai?**

The monetary unit of the U.A.E. is the dirham (designated as Dhs or AED, which stands for Arab Emirate Dirham), which is divided into 100 *fil*s. Bills come in the following denominations: 5 (brown note), 10 (green), 20 (light blue), 50 (purple), 100 (pink), 500 (blue), and 1,000 (burgundy). Please google AED to USD to get the current exchange rate

### **Language and Religion?**



**The Language** - English is widely spoken in Dubai and most public information is written in English as well as Arabic. There are many people from Iran and South Asia here speaking Persian, Hindi, Urdu, and Pashto, as well.

**The Religion** - Islam is the official religion of the U.A.E. and is integral to the local culture

#### What are the typical working days and hours?

The Weekend is Friday and Saturday. Office Business hours operate a split shift from 8 to 1, and then from 4 to 7.

#### What should I wear in Dubai?

**Women** are encouraged to wear dresses, knee length skirts, and anything not tight. You may want to avoid spaghetti vest tops, and try to cover your shoulders and back. However, when it comes to dressing for bars and clubs the rules no longer apply, and you should wear what you would in the US. For **men**, shorts and t-shirts are absolutely fine!

#### Are there any items that I cannot bring?

Pornographic material of any kind; non-Islamic material for the purpose of distributing to others, weapons, laser pens, ivory, and alcohol.

#### Can I get high?

DON'T DO IT! Penalties are severe, and with any proof in your bloodstream constitutes an offence of trafficking

#### Can I get drunk?

Liquor is readily available in clubs and hotels. But there are no stores that sell liquor to take with. We recommend you purchase your liquor at the duty free in JFK if you wish to have some in your room.

#### How do they feel about homosexuality in Dubai?

Although Homosexuality does exist on the ground in the UAE, it is actually illegal, and so it is best not to declare that you are gay. Penalties for homosexuality are up to 10 years in jail. However, if you do not flaunt your sexuality you should be fine.

#### Are there any safety concerns?

They not bout that life! The UAE is probably one of the safest places in the world. Considering that most people living there are expatriates there to make more money, no one wants to jeopardize their income generating potential, so crime is low! However, both Dubai and Abu Dhabi are notorious for car accidents, so be careful when crossing the streets.

**Tipping**

Many restaurants include a service charge, which will be clearly identified on your checks; for those that do not, a tip of 10% to 15% is appropriate.

**Is it safe to drink the water?**

Tap water is desalinated from the Gulf and is generally safe to drink, but most visitors prefer bottled mineral water, which is offered in most Dubai hotels and restaurants.

**Appropriate Gestures**

Swearing in public could get you a fine or even sent to jail

Public displays of affection are frowned upon

Sex outside of marriage is illegal. So don't have sex in front of a court house

Showing someone the sole of your shoe is considered an insult.

Crossing your legs(especially in front of someone of high importance) is considered rude

Don't give someone your back

Shaking hands is the normal male greeting. Use the right hand!

Shaking women's hands is not the norm. It may be best to wait until the hand is extended to you in this situation.

Always show respect to females( i.e. Give women the option to sit down where she wishes to sit, stand when she enters the room, and let her go through the door first) Apparently chivalry didn't die, it moved to Dubai.

## **MANAGING YOUR MONEY**

### **HOW TO EXCHANGE MONEY**

Ultimately, the decision on how to exchange your money is up to you. However, it has always been proven true that the best way to exchange your money is to withdraw money from an ATM in the destination country. Regardless of your decision on how to withdraw money, you **MUST** inform your bank and credit card companies that you will be overseas. Failure to do so will result in your card being deactivated. **Please note, the below exchange scenarios were done using Wells Fargo bank and Euros. The Base Exchange rate in this scenario is 1 US to 1.24 EU. While the scenarios below hold true regardless of currency and exchange rate, you are going to want to verify your banks exchange rates and fees prior to making your decision.**

#### **CONVERTING AT A BANK IN THE US(WELLS FARGO):**

The below scenario shows what happens when you exchange your money at a bank here in the US. Banks tend to add an exchange fee around 1% - 5% on top of the base exchange rate

## ***FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS***

### **HOW MUCH DOES THIS TRIP COST EXACTLY?**

Good question! Throughout this packet I'm sure you saw certain excursions had an indication that they cost extra, which might've caused confusion.

To answer, **the base price for this trip is \$2,350.**

### **HOW DO I MAKE PAYMENTS FOR THIS TRIP?**

There is a **deposit of \$200 due on March 31<sup>st</sup>** , after which **there is a manageable monthly payment of \$268.75 due the 15<sup>th</sup> of every month between April and November.** After making your deposit, **the monthly payment will be automatically withdrawn from your account.**

### **WHAT HAPPENS IF I MISS A PAYMENT/A PAYMENT FAILS TO BE WITHDRAWN FROM MY ACCOUNT?**

It happens to all of us! And we more than understand! If the automatic withdrawl fails on the 15<sup>th</sup>, we will try again each of the following 3 days(16<sup>th</sup>, 17<sup>th</sup>, 18<sup>th</sup>). If we are not able to process a payment on any of those days, we will reach out to you and attempt to work out an arrangement to get you caught up! If one can not be arranged then you were will be refunded based upon our refund policy.

### **WHAT'S THE REFUND POLICY?**

The policy is simple and one I'm sure you will find quite agreeable!

- Your deposit is 100% refundable up until the day before the first monthly payment is due, which is April 15<sup>th</sup>. After that , your deposit is non-refundable.
- Each payment received after April 15<sup>th</sup> is fully refundable up until the midway point, which is July 15<sup>th</sup>.

- All payments received after July 15<sup>th</sup> are fully refundable
- After December 20<sup>th</sup>, the trip is non-refundable. If you are in need of a refund, you will need to consult your travelers insurance.

### **HOW DO THESE ADD-ONS WORK?**

The way it works is when make your initial deposit, you will be presented with options for several add-ons. If one happens to tickle your fancy, you can select it and it will be added to your monthly payments. Your deposit will remain the same \$200, but your trip will be tailored to suit your every need!

While the option is there for you for a single occupancy room, by no means do you have to select it if traveling alone. 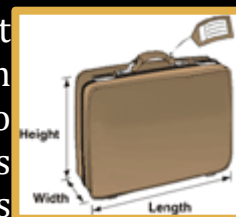
